Perennials are plants that grow and flower for three years or more. Most perennials are considered 'herbaceous': they die back to the ground each fall, but the roots remain alive to produce new foliage in the spring. A wide range of sizes, forms, colors and bloom times are available to suit your needs. With careful planning, a perennial garden can provide color from early spring to late fall. Most perennials are low maintenance. They require little more than basic care which includes

fertilizing, mulching and a general overall grooming from time to time.

Everything you need to plan, prepare and plant a lovely perennial garden is available for you here at Bordine's!

PLANNING YOUR GARDEN

Planning Your Garden: It is important that you choose appropriate plants for the site. Is the garden in a sunny area or does it get a lot of shade? What type of soil do you have? A soil test will give



you specific information about your soil. Get to know which plants will tolerate your conditions or add amendments (sphagnum peat and composted manure) and whatever else is recommended to help improve the condition of your soil. Choose plants you wish to include in your garden so that you will have color throughout the growing season. Adding bulbs to your plan will give early spring color before your perennials are in full bloom. Many perennials also have very attractive foliage which adds interest to your garden when their bloom time is over.

PLANTING

Planting: Water the plant thoroughly before removing it from the container. Dig the planting hole as deep and twice as wide as the container from which the plant has been removed. Check the root ball. If the roots are matted, loosen the soil and roots so that the plant grows into the surrounding soil more easily. The plant should then be set at the same depth as it was planted in the container. Once the plant is set securely in the ground and the roots are well covered, water thoroughly with Root & Grow Root Stimulator per package instructions. Water regularly until your plants are established. Some perennials such as Daylily, Iris or Peony require a precise planting depth. Placing these too deeply may result in fewer blooms. Also, pay close attention to the recommended spacing. Plants like Hosta can grow quite large compared to its size at the time of purchase.



DEADHEADING & CLEANING UP

Deadheading: This means to remove the faded flowers. Deadheading encourages the plant to produce more flowers and therefore lengthens the bloom time. Also, it improves the appearance of the plant and



the garden in general. Remove the flower stem as far below the leaves as possible without cutting off buds that may bloom in the future. Some plants with attractive seed pods or fronds like Rudbeckia, Sedum or Grasses can be left alone. They add interest to your garden during the winter months.

Cleaning Up: When the season comes to a close and frost has ended the growth of your plants, it's time to clean up. Most of your perennials can be cut back at this time to about 4-6" from the ground. Exceptions would be those that add winter interest to the garden such as Sedum, Coneflower and Grasses. It is a good idea to compost the cuttings from your garden. Separate any diseased debris first before adding to your compost pile.

Clinging Vines climb textured surfaces such as brick, stone or rough wood.

T Twining Vines climb by wrapping around a trellis, lattice, fence or open, grid-like structure.

Pruning helps control the size of the vine as well as encourage flowering:

If the vine blooms in early spring such as Akebia and Wisteria, prune as necessary shortly after flowering. If the vine blooms in late spring such as Honeysuckle and Trumpet Vine, prune in early spring or late fall as necessary to thin and shape.

Wisteria do not always flower reliably, try the following steps to encourage flowering:

- 1. Full sun location (8 or more hours of direct sunlight)
- 2. Superphosphate (0-20-0) fertilizer in early spring
- 3. Root prune in late fall (18" deep and from base of plant)

- 4. Low nitrogen fertilizer
- 5. Prune shoots back 1/3 to 1/2 of their length in July

Dividing & Fertilizing Perennials

Although some perennials can grow in the same location for many years, most need to be divided at some time. The most noticeable indications of this are when the plant dies out in the center, flowering decreases or the plant has grown too large for the space. Spring is the best time for dividing most plants as the plant has not yet leafed out and is easier to handle. However, early fall is also a good time to divide. The plant has slowed down its growth by then and can be trimmed back for better manageability. Spring blooming plants such as Peony and Iris should be divided in fall after they are done blooming. This allows the plant to focus its energy on creating beautiful flowers in spring, rather than being stressed out and trying to establish a new root system at the same time. To divide, dig the clump out of the ground using a spade or garden fork. Break the plant into several pieces using your hands to pull it apart or use a spade or knife to cut it into smaller clumps.

Fertilize in the spring when new growth begins using a slow release fertilizer such as **Esporna® Plant-tone**. Fertilize twice a year as specified in the instructions.

Perennial Grasses are an extremely diverse group of plants offering many colors, textures and forms suited to a wide range of growing conditions. Most Perennial Grasses prefer full sun (8 or more hours of direct sunlight), but many grow well in partial shade (4-8 hours of direct sunlight). Grasses with variegated leaves are more tolerant of shade conditions than Grasses with green foliage. The addition of composted manure and sphagnum peat will insure a healthy planting. These products help nurture the plant, hold moisture and aerate the soil. Perennial Grasses should be trimmed to a height of around 4" in April. You may cut them back in the fall but they tend to overwinter better if left standing until spring. Many Grasses hold their shape through the winter months adding interesting contrast, color and sound to the winter garden.

Pruning Shrubs

Shrubs that flower late in the season (generally after June 15th), can be pruned any time of the year, although early spring before new growth begins is best. Shrubs that bloom earlier than June 15th should be pruned immediately after they finish flowering.



Bluebeard, **Butterfly Bush** & **Hypericum** may experience dieback in severe winters. Prune off dead twigs on these shrubs in the spring after new growth starts.

Althea are one of the last shrubs to leaf out, often not showing growth until late May or early June. Be careful to wait until growth appears before pruning. Pruning too early may remove branches that are in fact alive.

The following is a list of shrubs that bloom on the previous year's growth and should only be pruned *after* flowering:

Almond, Flowering • Forsythia • Hydrangea (certain types) • Lilac • Mockorange • Viburnum

Hydrangea Care

Hydrangeas provide outstanding garden interest with large, colorful flowers during July and August.

Knowing how to properly care for these garden favorites can help maximize their performance in your landscape.

Fertilization - Hydrangeas perform best if given two applications of a natural fertilizer such as Espoma® Holly-tone each year.

Flower Color - Many varieties of Bigleaf and Mountain Hydrangeas have the ability to change flower color depending on the pH of the soil. <As a general rule, the following colors will result at these various pH levels. - pH between 5.5 & 6.0.....very blue - pH between 7.0 & 7.5..... very pink> A simple soil pH test can be used to determine the pH of your soil. Most soils in our area will naturally produce pink flowers. Adding Aluminum Sulfate will lower the pH of the soil and increase the blue color. Amending the pH of the soil should be done in May before the flower buds are set. This usually needs to be done every year to maintain a lower pH for blue flowers.

Pruning Hydrangeas-

Annabelle and Peegee Varieties - No pruning is really necessary except to remove spent flowers, broken or entangled branches or for general shaping. Prune in early spring before new growth emerges.

Oakleaf, Bigleaf and Mountain Varieties - Delay spring pruning until new growth has fully emerged. At this time, remove any winter damaged tips or stems that have not produced leaves. Prune to shape after flowering.

Pruning Potentilla & Spirea

Potentilla & Spirea do best when pruned annually. To keep plants looking full & bushy, remove about 1/3 of the stems to the ground and then trim the entire plant back by 1/3 in late winter or early spring. A light trimming of a few inches after they flower will usually provide a new display of flowers in a few weeks.

roses simplified

Roses can be a beautiful addition to your garden and can be planted any time from spring to fall. Consider these basic planting tips and general care before planting your roses.

- Plant in an area receiving at least 6 hours of direct sunlight. Morning sun and late afternoon shade are ideal to help prevent disease and maintain optimal flower color.
- Locate roses away from large trees or shrubs which will compete for food, moisture and sunlight.
- Roses perform best in well-drained soil high in organic matter. Poor soil conditions can be improved by using such products as Bordine Complete Planting Mix and Bumper Crop Organic Soil Builder.
- Water close to the base of your roses without watering the foliage. Avoid watering with overhead sprinklers if at all possible. Wet foliage can lead to disease problems, especially if left moist overnight.
- To maintain cool and moist roots and to help prevent weeds apply 2" of mulch around the base of your roses. Consider organic mulches such as Pine Bark or Pine Straw. Remove and replace mulch each spring to help prevent disease.
- Roses require a constant supply of nutrients. Fertilize with Rose-tone at the beginning of the growing season and every 4 weeks after. Stop fertilizing mid August to allow roses to harden off before winter.

An Eastern exposure is the preferred placement for this group of plants. Most Broadleaf Evergreens enjoy morning sun for their foliage and flowering vigor, but prefer to keep cool in the afternoon shade. Just as important is the protection found here during the winter months when strong winds and sunlight can severely damage the leaves and buds.

Pruning Evergreens

Reasons for Pruning - In general, most evergreens need minimal pruning. It is important to choose the correct size evergreen for its location when planning a landscape, as it is nearly impossible to correct an overgrown evergreen by pruning. Damage can occur to branches from wind, ice, disease & insect problems. These dead or damaged branches will need to be removed to prevent more damage from occurring. This type of pruning should be done as soon as the need arises, since waiting could allow disease to spread to healthy wood.



Spruces can be trimmed while young to produce a fuller tree by trimming the new growth by 1/3 to 1/2. This should be done after the new growth has hardened off in July. More severe pruning can be done by cutting back into last year's growth, just be sure to make the cut above a side branch or bud.

Pines can be made fuller by trimming new growth back by 1/3 to 1/2, however, do not trim into last year's growth, as they do not possess the dormant buds that the Firs & Spruce do and will not replace the branches removed.

Arborvitae and Junipers can also be kept more compact by cutting back new growth. These plants tend to have a 'dead zone', or interior area where there is no foliage, so cutting back too far exposes the dead zone, & is very unsightly. Severe pruning should be done in early spring so the new growth will fill in the exposed areas.

Yews can be trimmed to maintain a formal shape if desired. Their new growth can be trimmed as needed in mid-June. Yews can also have a second light pruning in late September. Do not over prune late in the year.


Broadleaf Evergreens Azalea, Pieris & Rhododendron bloom off of the previous year's growth & should only be pruned immediately after flowering. Boxwood, Euonymous & Holly can be pruned to maintain size & shape in late winter or early spring. Avoid over pruning late in the year.

Japanese Maples are a unique specimen tree that can add beauty and elegance to most any landscape! Gain the most out of your Japanese Maple by providing the ideal location and environment with these planting tips:

- Achieve best leaf coloration and prevent leaf scorching by planting in areas with mid to late afternoon shade
- Plant in a location protected from northwest winds and southern sun to reduce chance of winter damage
- Plant in a moist, well-drained soil and mulch to maintain cool roots and help maintain moisture level

Choosing the Right Tree for Your Landscape

A properly selected tree can add beauty and value to your landscape. By choosing a tree that is ideal for your yard you can avoid undesired and sometimes costly ramifications down the road. Consider some of the following points.

Mature Height and Spread - Choose a tree that at full maturity will fit in the area that you are planting in. For example, if planting under utility lines choose a tree with a mature height of 25' or less.

Form and Shape - Consider what you want the overall function of the tree to be. A columnar tree is ideal for small areas or where taller screening is desired. Round or vase-shaped trees provide the most overhead coverage and are ideal for providing shade.

Sun, Soil and Moisture Requirements - Plan ahead and check your soil moisture content and how many hours of sunlight the area receives before selecting a tree. Then choose a tree that matches the same requirements to insure success in the decades ahead.

Growth Rate - Fast growing trees will continue to grow fast, so make sure the area where you are planting is large enough for the tree to grow.

Seeds and Fruit - Trees with fruit or seeds provide food for wildlife, however planted near a busy sidewalk or driveway can be messy. Try planting the same tree in a low traffic area to receive the many benefits it has to offer without the added mess close to your front door.

Protecting Your Plants

Mulching Guidelines

Decorative mulches add the finishing touch to any landscape by providing a consistent & colorful covering over the soil. Mulching materials are available in a wide variety of colors and textures to compliment your plants and surroundings.




Improper mulching can cause damage to the bark of trees & shrubs.

Avoid "mulch volcanoes" like the one pictured here.

Mulch should not be allowed to smother the trunk or stems, which can lead to decay & death of the plant. As a general rule, keep mulch 3-6" away from the base of the plant.



Maintain a mulch area around your trees & shrubs to prevent damage by lawn mowers & string trimmers.

Antler Rubs

Antler rubs can occur between September and December on younger trees (<4" trunk diameter) or on shrubs with sturdy branching as small as 3/4" diameter.

Damage most often includes scraped bark and broken branches, however, young trees may be completely snapped off by this rubbing action. Sturdy trunk guards or fencing barriers are the only way to protect your vulnerable plants during this time of year if male deer are present.

fruit tree pollination basics

Fruit tree pollination is the process by which pollen from the male flower parts are transferred to the female parts by pollinating insects, thus resulting in seed and fruit development. Weather plays a vital role during the flowering period. Frost/freeze events, prolonged rains or high winds can reduce pollination success and therefore quantity of fruit. Bee activity is critical, so having other inviting spring blooming plants nearby will increase your chances of successful pollination.

Selected tree varieties are able to produce fruit on their own, hence the term SELF-POLLINATING. Most Apricot, Tart Cherry, Nectarine, Peach and European Plum fall into this category. However, heavier crops will occur if a different variety of that type is available to cross-pollinate with.

The remaining tree varieties, including Apple, Pear, Sweet Cherry and Japanese Plum require a SECOND VARIETY of the same tree type to properly cross-pollinate with. Please note that 2 trees of the same variety will not pollinate each other. Locate cross-pollinating varieties within 50' of one another to help insure bee activity and pollen exchange between the trees.

It all begins with the soil...and more!

Soils 101

All types of plants will grow better when given the proper soil conditions. Many landscapes in developed areas have had much of the nutrient rich topsoil removed prior to construction, only to have a fraction of it replaced upon completion. The remaining "soil" is often a compacted, poorly aerated and sterile place for plant roots to grow. Not surprisingly, the worst areas are often near the foundation, sidewalks and patios - the most common places where we want to locate plants.

The key to planting success is to make it easy for new plant roots to quickly expand into the surrounding soil so they can breathe, gather water and nutrients, plus firmly anchor the plant. Many plant problems begin as a result of struggling roots, so the more you can do for your soil early on, the more you'll be rewarded in the future.

Rarely does anyone have perfect soil, but even good soils will benefit from the addition of organic materials such as **Bordine's Complete Planting Mix**, **Sphagnum Peat** or **Bumper Crop Organic Soil Builder**. Thoroughly dig in or rototill these amendments to a minimum depth of at least 6-8" in the planting area. The more you amend the soil, the better, whether by hand or with a rototiller. As you work the ground, discard any debris or stubborn clumps to make room for the additional materials.

If your planting areas feel more like a concrete driveway rather than a garden, then you have a little more to do. Initially, you will want to break up the ground to a depth of 8-10" before incorporating the above mentioned organic materials. Adding **Pine Bark Mulch** or **Mini-Nuggets** along with those amendments will help to acidify the soil as well as create aeration as they break down.

Fertilizing

When installing most woody plants (trees, shrubs & evergreens), one of the most beneficial ways of feeding your plants begins with something that is not a fertilizer at all. Naturally occurring fungi called mycorrhizae are often missing from many landscape soils and should be added back in. Their presence helps to expand the root systems of the plants they colonize. This symbiotic relationship is beneficial to both as the fungi bring water and dissolved nutrients to the roots whereas the plant provides the fungi with the sugars they need to proliferate. MYKE® Growth Enhancer is a blend of mycorrhizae that can be applied to the root ball and backfill soil of new plantings. Using the recommended amount of MYKE®, cover the root system with the powder-like product and then place the additional product into the planting hole. ***Unfortunately, plants from the Ericaceae family (Azalea, Pieris, Rhododendron and Blueberry) are unable to interact with mycorrhizae, so no benefit occurs.


At planting time use a starter fertilizer like **Root & Grow Root Stimulator** to promote early root formation and stronger root development. In addition, you can also incorporate any of the slow-release Espoma fertilizers like **Holly-tone**, **Tree-tone**, **Plant-tone** or **Rose-tone** at planting time to provide additional nutrients for expanding roots.

Mulching

Organic mulches add the finishing touch to your plantings by providing a consistent and colorful covering over the soil. In addition, mulch helps to protect roots from seasonal temperature extremes, lessen water loss from the soil, plus reduce erosion and weed growth. Over time, the gradual breakdown of mulch helps to replenish vital organic matter to the soil so that beneficial organisms may continue to thrive.

Watering

There is no magic formula on how often and how much water to apply. Just keep in mind that temperatures, precipitation, winds, sun exposure and soil all affect the needs of your plants. Check the moisture content of the root ball and then water as needed for the first full season and beyond. When you water, be sure to target the root ball and apply enough water to penetrate the full depth of the root system.
